
Home-Based Activities





We encourage you to try as many activities as you would like with your child. We hope you and your child will have an enjoyable time doing these activities!

What can you do with your child?

Racing Word Worms!

Share with your child that you are going to have a "worm race" today. Your child will have fun exploring different ways of moving the worm without touching it. If you have an older/younger child, you can get them to join in too!


Through this activity, your child will be able to...

- Recognise and sound out familiar words from Starlight big books
- Practise fine motor skills when cutting with a scissors
- Show perseverance as he/she tries to blow the worm to the finishing line

Materials needed: Strips of paper, straws, scissors, paper, tape, word cards (Annex A)

Activity:

- Gather 2 players to make a paper worm each (see https://youtu.be/Yss3-upCVWM).
- Choose 10 words from **Annex A** and write them on separate word cards.
- Set up the game like in the picture below using tape to mark the start and end.
- Players will use a straw to blow at the worm.
- The person whose worm reaches the finishing line first will read out the word.
- If read correctly, he/she wins the round and keeps the card.
- Replace the word card at the finishing line and play again.
- The player with more word cards wins!
- Optional: Make your own list of words to suit your child's needs.



Spot a Shadow

This activity allows your child to explore how shadows are formed using different objects and sources of light. He/she will also be able to use the shadows to create an artwork by tracing the lines and shapes that are observed.


Through this activity, your child will be able to...

- Create an artwork by tracing lines and shapes
- Explore how shadows are formed

Materials: Paper, pencil, colour pencils, any source of light (torchlight, sunlight, etc.), objects to create shadows (optional), marker (optional, to outline)

Activity:

- Conduct this activity in the early morning or late afternoon.
- Find a spot in the house where there is a shadow (e.g. by the window, near a lamp).
- Place the paper under the shadow and tape it down.
- Ask your child what lines or shapes from the shadow he/she sees.
- Invite him/her to trace the lines and shapes.
- After tracing, invite your child to colour the artwork.
- Optional: Invite your child to use a marker to trace new shadows over the completed artwork
 by shifting the location of the paper or rotating it. Your child can also use objects to create their
 own shadows.



Helping Coupons

Children can learn a lot from doing household chores. Doing chores helps children learn about what they need to do to care for themselves and their family. When children contribute to family life, it helps them feel competent and responsible.

Through this activity, your child will be able to...

- Develop confidence in carrying out simple tasks
- Show appreciation and care for others
- Communicate through drawing and writing

Materials: Paper for coupons (Annex B), writing and colouring tools.

Activity:

- Invite your child to ask what household chores each family member does.
- Ask your child to create 2 coupons by writing or drawing 1 chore per coupon (Annex B).
- Invite your child to give the coupons to his/her family members.
- Family members can choose when they can redeem the coupons.

Plastic Bottle Planter

There are many creative ways to recycle, repurpose, and reuse plastic bottles. Children can make creative planters using plastic bottles and use them to grow beautiful plants. Have fun going green and growing greens!

Through this activity, your child will be able to...

- Show appreciation and care for nature
- Use a variety of materials to create a 3D artwork

Materials: Plastic bottles, scissors/pen knife, paint, markers, glue, craft materials

Activity:

- Ask your child to collect 2 plastic bottles.
- Help him/her to cut off the top 1/3 of the bottle.
- Let your child explore with the different art tools and materials to decorate his/her planters.
- Once the bottles are ready, your child may use them for the activity "Watch Us Grow".







Watch Us Grow

Children will plant two types of seeds and make observations. Record these observations and discuss the differences between the two plants.

Through this activity, your child will be able to...

- Record and share their observations
- Show care and responsibility for their plants
- Use comparative vocabulary to compare the 2 plants

Materials: 2 types of seeds (e.g. mung bean, soybean, chilli), transparent containers, soil/cotton wool, water, seeds' growth journal (**Annex C**)

Activity:

- Discuss with your child what seeds can be found at home and grown in Singapore.
- Invite him/her to pick 2 seeds and plant them in separate containers.
- Share with him/her that plants need water, air and sunlight to grow.
- Highlight to your child that he/she will be responsible for watering the plants daily.
- Following the first day, invite your child to observe the changes to the seeds.
- Guide your child to describe the differences using phrases such as "same as", "taller than", "shorter than", "more than" and "less than". For example:
 - The chilli plant is shorter than the mung bean plant.
 - The soybean plant has more leaves than the mung bean plant.
 - o Both plants have the same number of leaves.
- Invite your child to record their daily observations in their journal (Annex C).
- Optional: This activity can be extended throughout the May holidays.

Sound Detective

Children will identify things with the beginning sounds "br, fl, st and ch". They can look for pictures with the target sounds and create picture collages for them.

Through this activity, your child will be able to...

- Identify pictures by their beginning sounds
- Use the picture cut-outs to create collages

Materials: Newspapers/magazines/pamphlets, clue cards (Annex D), scissors, glue, writing tools.

Activity:

- Provide your child with old newspapers/magazines/pamphlets.
- Tell your child that he/she will be a sound detective.
- Give your child 1 clue card (Annex D).
- Get him/her to find pictures or words that match the sound on the clue card.
- Invite your child to cut out and glue the pictures/words to the clue card.
- Repeat this activity on a different day for a different sound.

Let's Make 6

The children were introduced to the part-whole relationship of number 5 in our previous Home-Based Activity. This activity helps children to reinforce their understanding on part whole relationship by exploring the different combinations of making "6".

Through this activity, your child will be able to...

• To understand part-whole relationship

Materials: 1 kitchen roll core, 12 rubber bands in two colours (e.g. 6 red and 6 green).

Activity:

- Ask your child to find a partner (e.g. a sibling, yourself).
- Each person will pick 6 rubber bands of the same color.
- Invite your child to choose a number from 0-6.
- He/she will put that number of rubber bands through the kitchen roll core.
- His/her partner will add on his/her rubber band to form the quantity 6.
- Get the pair to check that they have 6 rubber bands around their kitchen roll core.

 Optional: If your child is playing alone, he/she can form the quantity 6 using rubber bands of 2 different colours.

Balloon Tennis!

It's time to get the children's bodies moving! The children were introduced to the overhead strike skill in class so get them to practise it at home too!

Through this activity, your child will be able to...

- Demonstrate control and coordination as they strike a balloon
- Take turns with another player

Materials: A balloon, batting equipment (e.g. stick/spatula/paper plate/fly or just a couple of hands), 2 supports that are ≥1m high (e.g. back rest of the chair), a long string.


Activity:

- Blow a balloon and assign a play area for your child.
- Place 2 chairs about 1.5m apart and tie a string between them. The string should be ≥1m from the ground.
- Toss a balloon to 1 of the players to start the rally.
- The players are to strike the balloon back and forth over the string using the overhead strike steps (see below).
- Start keeping scores to make the game more challenging.

Overhead strike steps:


- 1. Hold the balloon.
- 2. Toss the balloon upwards.
- 3. Swing the other hand / batting equipment towards the balloon.
- 4. Strike the balloon.







